
- Maintain contact with class teachers: notes & email, attend interviews

- Discuss future plans & goals for improvement






STUDENT A READS

- · 20 minutes per day
- · 3,600 minutes per school year
- 1,800,000 words per year





STANDARDIZED TESTS

STUDENT B READS

- 5 minutes per day
- · 900 minutes per school year
- 282,000 words per year





SCORES IN THE 50TH PERCENTILE ON STANDARDIZED TESTS

STUDENT C READS

- 1 minute per day
- 180 minutes per school year
- 8,000 words per year





SCORES IN THE 10TH PERCENTILE ON STANDARDIZED TESTS

If they start reading for 20 minutes per night in Kindergarten, by the end of 6th grade, Student A will have read for the equivalent of 60 school days, Student B will have read for 12 school days, and Student C will have read for 3.



Schools

- be clear about requirements (such as BYOD)

- tell someone if something makes me feel uncomfortable
- treat people online with the same respect as in person

MOBILE PHONE /SMARTWATCHES POLICY

Use of personal digital devices during school time is not allowed – this includes mobile phones, laptops, tablets and smartwatches.

Students should only bring a device to school if it is absolutely necessary e.g. travel alone to and from school

Students must sign the 'Appropriate Use of Mobile Phones at School Agreement' before bringing a phone to school.

Mobile
phones/smartwatches
must be signed in and out
at the office everyday.
They must not be used on
school grounds.

Students are not allowed to take their phones/smartwatches to school excursions or camps.

If you need to contact your child during school hours, you must call the school office.

Transition to High School

- Discuss plans with your child to help them be aware of their choices for 2024 & 2025
- Begin plans now complete the Year 6 Expression Of Interest Form for local Government High School or Non-local choice – will be sent home early in the school year.
- Non-Government HS require a separate application apply at the school
- Attend Information and Open Nights
- Selective High Schools require an entrance examination and application in the previous year.
- Please understand that we are not able to write personal references for children.

Moving into Year 7 in a NSW Government School

- Your local high school will be written on the form according to the local high school boundaries set by the DoE
- If not wanting your child to attend that school, you should apply to a different (non-local) high school (Section C)
- Students applying to Selective High Schools should also complete this section in case a student misses the selective school offer
